

### Celebrating Success



Amy is an artist, fashion designer, domestic violence survivor and Crisis Assistance client of Rowan Helping Ministries. Amy's experience of being homeless influenced her fashion design. We have journeyed with her to find her pathway home.

Amy first connected with Rowan Helping Ministries 17 years ago. She escaped an abusive relationship and sought shelter at a Battered Women's Shelter. On her journey to recover from the abuse, she was referred to Rowan Helping Ministries for assistance and we did just that. With help from our Crisis Assistance Team, Amy found an apartment and received clothing, food, and utility assistance. Unfortunately, after all that she accomplished, Amy had a set back. "It started with the domestic violence, 2 years after getting my apartment he found me and I lost everything. I moved in with another abuser for 10 years. It got very bad." Just when she thought things were getting better, Amy ended up being homeless with her dog.

Amy spent several years moving from state to state while dealing with physical and mental scars resulting from the abuse she suffered. It was at her lowest point that she tapped into her God given talent of sewing to not only help her to cope mentally, but to stay warm during the winter. "It really started when I was out on the street with my service dog. Because it was cold, and we were in the snow, I used flannel shirts and blankets to make clothes so we would be warm." Amy used items she found in the trash, donated blankets, and used clothing as material for her designs. She explained that not only did her custom pieces keep her warm, it was also a way to protect her property from being stolen. "You have to carry everything around and if you are not careful, your things will get snatched- so it literally has to be on your body. Amy is a self-taught seamstress who pulls inspiration from scrap material to make dresses, hats, sweaters and so much more. "I look at the material and I wing it. Basically, it's the fabric that says to me I am a shirt, I am a hat."

While living on the streets, Amy decided to reconnect with her mother. After years of not seeing each

other, she opened the doors to her small cabin and welcomed Amy and her dog Grace into her home. She is still by Amy's side today as her support system. "When Amy first got here (Salisbury) Rowan Helping Ministries was the first place, she said she wanted to come to for help. Since we've been coming here her whole behavior and attitude has changed," says Amy's mom. Amy remembered the help she received from us years ago and decided to reach out again for help. She connected with Cathy Wood-Romero, Crisis & Housing Manager, who enrolled her in our Back at Home program. Amy has also been connected to mental health resources and officially diagnosed by a doctor for Complex PTSD. She is currently in therapy and we financial assistance for medication to help her cope with her trauma. Amy truly appreciates Rowan Helping Ministries for helping her get back on her feet "It made me feel like I wasn't invalid, I had someone that was willing to help me get on my feet," she explained. She has also built a close relationship with Cathy Wood-Romero. "I love my Cathy! She takes care of my mental problems. I trust her, and I don't trust people at all."

Currently, Amy is dedicated to her passion of design and is looking for ways to use her work to help those in need. "I want to be whole again because I want to help people. I want to help the homeless and those who experience domestic violence." Because of her mental diagnoses, she is unable to work but is trying to get disability benefits. Cathy referred Amy to our community partner who is assisting her with her disability claim. Amy's goal is to be financially independent. She is working to monetize her passion and turn her design business "Only One Amy" into a brand. "I want to be able to show people they can look nice even if it comes out of the trash. You don't have to go out and buy new stuff, actually blankets are even better fabric and cheaper. Everyone has blankets."

With the help of our crisis assistance team, we are dedicated to connecting Amy to resources to obtain income, to maintain stable housing, as well as further her passion. She currently donates her custom designs to our clothing center and shares her story to inspire those who are in need. She believes sewing is a great form of therapy "When a lady is sitting down with her kids at night in the shelter with nothing to do but think about stuff, sew you something."


### North Hills Christian School

Naloxone is a life-saving medication that can reverse an overdose from opioids, including heroin, fentanyl, and prescription opioid medications.
